In late summer, my pastor invited my friend Mary and me to head Faith Formation at our church. I eagerly embraced the opportunity to create meaningful curricula for study groups. Their stories touched me. One woman, a new American, described meeting a homeless man who needed a blanket. She began to crochet. Over the next few weeks, coworkers offered her yarn for her prayerful project. Eventually, she draped her crocheted afghan over the chilled man's shoulders. Her story made my eyes prickle with tears. Only then did I realize that I "led" this group not to teach, but to learn more love from these grace-filled women.
